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On November 2, 2021, Edward-Elmhurst Health began it's new stroke protocol for patients who meet inclusion criteria experiencing an acute ischemic stroke. The new protocol indicates patients will be administered tenecteplase as the thrombolytic of choice for ischemic stroke. This course provides physicians with knowledge and competence pertaining to updated clinical practice guidelines, stroke-related target time metrics, differentiation of ischemic stroke syndromes, prescribing dual antiplatelet therapy (DAPT), and NIH Stroke Scale interpretations.
